Coming this Fall – New Choirs...

"**Body, mind, spirit, voice. It takes a whole person to rejoice.**" – Helen Kemp (often described as "the mother of the children's church choir movement")

These words from Helen Kemp, who has spent her lifetime working with children's choirs, will guide us this Fall as we begin a children's choir program at MPC. We are excited to begin offering these opportunities to our children:

Cherub Choir – Grades K–2: Cherubs will learn that singing their faith is fun. Through songs and musical games, our youngest children will help in leading worship and learn basic choral skills in a nurturing environment.

JoySong – Grades 3 – 5: Finding their singing voices, playing musical games, learning songs and hymns that will "stick" with them through their growing years – these are only a few of the things children will experience in JoySong.

Both choirs will focus on building relationships – with each other, and with God.

Again, from Helen Kemp: "If through this adventure of singing, a boy or girl has felt nurtured or uplifted, then this practice has been worth it. And those children in our choirs will be our next generation of leaders in church."

Choirs begin this Fall. Rehearsals will be on Sunday afternoons, 4:30 – 5:30. Look for registration forms in the next newsletter.

AdventuRing! A new handbell choir starting this Fall at MPC – for 6th grade and up. This introductory choir will allow kids and adults to explore the fun and challenge of ringing English Handbells. Under the Radar: Ka Guinn

Ka Toothman (who is unrelated to the Toothman family of MPC) was born in Front Royal, grew up in Richmond, and moved to Lexington when she was 12. Her mother was a teacher; her father worked in the oil business and then purchased a service station in the Lexington area. After high school Ka came to Harrisonburg and majored in home economics education at Madison College. After graduating, she taught in Woodbridge and met her future husband Mike Guinn the day she accepted the job there. He was teaching there also. She had seen him previously in Harrisonburg (he attended Bridgewater College) but they had never spoken until that day. The rest, as they say, is history.

The Toothman family were members at Ben Salem Presbyterian Church, a small church between Lexington and Buena Vista. As a youth Ka was deeply impressed by her church's history, especially its small balcony where slaves had sat during worship services in the distant past. Ben Salem's building impresses her even now in memory as "a safe place to grow up in." (Down to the very hour of this interview with her, she is still sensitive to what the interior of the worship space can convey; she was about to spend most of the day working on sewing the paraments that will hang in the sanctuary for Ordinary Time.) Ben Salem's pastor at the time was the Rev. Marvin Simmers, who had grown up here in MPC. There were not a lot of children in that church, but Simmers made sure the young people in his two small churches were not ignored, even if, as she said, "Sunday School was always an iffy experience." She did not have a youth group to attend, but she served for two years on Lexington Presbytery's Youth Council, which she found a broadening experience. Her pastor also brought her to Massanetta Springs for conferences. Years later, she and Sally Brown of MPC became aware they were at one of the conferences at the same time, got out their rolled-up photographs of the attendees, and found that they were seated next to each other! One year she assisted her pastor who was directing a camp. It is clear that this faithful pastor had a profound influence on this growing girl. It shines through her spontaneous words: "Marvin Simmers was the church!"

While they were teaching in Woodbridge Ka and Mike were married, and after Mike had completed five years there, they left—without jobs in sight—and drove to the West Coast for the summer. They decided that Oregon was the only place enough like Virginia, and especially like the Valley, that they would want to live there. But the Valley called them back, and Mike found a job teaching at Montevideo High School. Ka started teaching special education at Massanutten Technical Center—a hothouse, in that the tar dripped off the roof inside her classroom space in long strings. After teaching for five years Ka 'retired' for 6 years to start a family—and during that period she earned a master's degree in special education. She returned, taught for 4 years, and then went to pre-school special education teaching at Pleasant Valley Elementary School for two years, and for two more at John Wayland Elementary School in Bridgewater. Then South River school opened in Grottoes and she finished out her career there with nine more years. This month, after 41 years of teaching and coaching, Mike is leaving the system; Ka retired seven years ago.

Ka's devotion to her church, honed at Ben Salem, has flowered abundantly during her years at MPC. She has spent two terms as an elder. As an educator, you would expect her to be involved in producing something in MPC's educational program that would not be "iffy"—for here the resources are at hand to produce quality programming. When her sons were little she taught Sunday School children. Then for ten years Ka taught an adult class (in some cases intergenerational) where she covered subjects like other faiths, various Bible studies (Romans is a favorite), laughter, even Andy Griffith's shows on TV. More recently, she has been actively involved in writing curriculum for Faith Village. That being on a six-year cycle, the materials for next year (#7) will need some "tweaking"—and she is already giving some thought to that. She took part in 3 years of the Disciples program.

Ka has gone on mission trips to Mississippi, Barber Scotia College, and Wytheville. She works currently as a bagger in the MPC Food Pantry. She loves to cook, and she has cooked for our youth and for our adult choir at Montreat conferences. She plays in both of MPC's adult handbell choirs. She is the "Buyer" for Faith Village and sees that the materials and supplies are distributed to the classrooms prior to classes. More often than not you can find her in the kitchen; she has worked in Fellowship functions and has cooked for WOW.

At several occasions when different teaching jobs opened up during her public school career, she has felt like the opportunity was specifically matched to her gifts, and she has undertaken the move with zest. One gets the feeling that her heart is so deeply involved with her church and her Lord that her zest shows up again and again in her varied tasks. So much accomplished across the years, and such a consecrated life! MPC is so fortunate to have Ka, and so many others like her.

MPC Education Grants/Scholarships Available...

The Stewardship and Finance Ministry is now accepting applications for grants/scholarships to be awarded this fall. Any member of Massanutten who is a graduating high senior and has been accepted by a two year or four year institute of higher education, or a person enrolling in a Presbyterian Seminary for a degree in the ministry or a degree in Christian education is eligible.

Grants/scholarships are determined on the basis of experiences, leadership, church and community activities. The amounts awarded will be determined by the funds available from the MPC Education Endowment.

Applications can be secured from the church office. Please submit applications along with two reference letters from two people and high school grade transcripts or for college students, a record of current grades. Application deadline is **June 25, 2010**.

Our selection process does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, age, sex, or national origin, or physical handicap.

A Plastic Bottle Is Only the Beginning...

Most people are very much aware of recycling aluminum cans, but have you ever given much thought about the plastic bottles that many beverages now come in? The U. S. alone produces approximately 40 billion plastic bottles annually. Of that number less than 30% are recycled. The other 70% end up in landfills, or as randomly scattered trash. The ones that end up in a landfill take up a significant portion of landfill space. It takes approximately 700 years for one of these bottles to completely decompose.

The question is: **what can be done to reduce/eliminate this?** The obvious answer is to recycle them into new plastic bottles, which is being done. However, there are other applications with which these recycled plastic bottles can be used.

One of the more interesting applications is to convert them into textile fibers. Basically the process is:

- Bottles are collected by recycling centers.
- The bottles are sorted by style or color, and de-capped.
- The labels are removed and the containers are washed.
- Clean containers are sent to a plastic recycling facility.
- The bottles are compressed and ground into fine flakes.
- The flakes are melted, and then formed into strands.
- These strands are crimped, stretched to desired length, cut, and baled.
- Finally these strands, or fibers, are spun into yarn and woven into fabric.

What can be done with these fibers?

- Ten bottles equals approximately one pound of fiber.
- Fiber from twenty-five two-liter bottles can be woven into one medium sized fleece pullover.
- Approximately eighty-five plastic soft drink bottles can insulate one large sleeping bag.
- One square foot of carpeting can be made from approximately fourteen plastic bottles.

Recycled plastic bottles have also been used to make:

- Decking material
- Fencing.
- Railroad ties

Recycling plastic containers results in tremendous savings of other resources such as water and fuel. Using recycled plastics creates reduced amounts of air emissions. Approximately 1,000 pounds of toxic emissions and forty-two gallons of fuel are saved for every 150 jackets made from recycled plastic bottles.

This summer as you sit by the beach, your local pool, or relax on your deck with a refreshing drink, do not look at the empty plastic bottle as trash. It could end up being that new fleece jacket that keeps you warm next winter!

Thank you for recycling ...

Thank you for recycling the items you use at church! We are recycling aluminum cans, pie pans, tin cans, glass (all colors); paper, newspaper, paperboard and card board (*please break down all cardboard boxes*) and plastic – any with a number on the bottom.
